Annual General Meeting

Our 2006/7 Annual General Meeting was held on 1 September at our office in Community Base. The Annual Report is now available on our website. Please do take a few

minutes to read our report to see the wide variety of work that we are doing. The past year has been a very busy one for FFT with a lot of new initiatives being undertaken but, as

always, the focus of the coming year will need to be on identifying and securing additional sources of funding to enable us to continue our work on behalf of all Gypsies and Travellers.

Choosing Health

In the current debate about the National Health Service and the Government's agenda to widen choice for patients the fact that Gypsies and Travellers often have little or no choice regarding their own healthcare can get overlooked. The basic services of healthcare, dentistry or social care that most of us take for granted are simply not accessible to travelling communities for a whole variety of reasons. These may be about the frequent evictions that they experience, the difficulty of registering with a GP or dentist or simply a lack of knowledge of the options available to them. Because of the understandable distrust that the travelling communities have of

statutory agencies it is often difficult for mainstream health and social care professionals to reach out to the community, even where they have the best of intentions. Our health and social care outreach service in Brighton & Hove and East Sussex provides a necessary bridge between the statutory agencies and the travelling communities and serves as a best practice model of service delivery that we would like to see rolled out to other areas of the country.

Because travelling communities find it so difficult to access mainstream healthcare there is also evidence that many people are resorting to Accident and

Emergency departments of hospitals in order to receive treatment. Not only is this often inappropriate in meeting the needs of the patient but it also puts undue pressure on overstretched and under resourced accident and emergency services. In partnership with Brighton University we are about to undertake a research study on the use of A&E services by Gypsies and Travellers and we hope to make recommendations that will not only lead to better services for the travelling communities but may also provide lessons that can be applied towards improving the healthcare of other disadvantaged minority groups.

Those of you who know our colleague, Tammy Furey, will probably have heard the good news of the arrival of Tammy and Shaun's baby daughter Megan. We send our congratulations and good wishes to all three. Whilst Tammy is away on maternity leave Clare Bingham will be covering her post.

A big thank you to Martina Hluskova, from Slovakia, who has been volunteering with FFT to help our work with Roma families living in the Hastings area of Sussex. Martina has had to return to Slovakia for family reasons but will keep in touch and hopes to return to England next year.

It is great to know that there are people out there

like Martina, prepared to use their particular skills on a voluntary basis on behalf of Gypsies and Travellers.

Volunteering

As a small organisation there is a limit to the number of volunteers that we can take on but we are always keen to hear from people who may be able to help us in our work. We also facilitated

some work with Roma families in Hastings, alongside the Cultural Diversity Network, which culminated in the Roma 'Bring a Dish' Day. The day was a wonderful celebration of Gypsy and Roma culture, with Roma food and flamenco dancing. This was a great opportunity for us to engage with European Roma families and to highlight their service

entitlements.

Our colleague Patricia Knight put together a fabulous exhibition of photographs for the Hastings Festival. The pictures were taken by Gypsy Travellers themselves and were put up as part of a festival celebrating the local community.

Traveller Advice Project Update

Training the Agencies

We are running seminars for advice agencies, such as Citizens Advice, Shelter, Help the Aged, and others in the South East of England to increase their knowledge of, and capacity to work with, Gypsies and Travellers. The first of these seminars will be in Eastbourne on 22 November, and the second in Pulborough, West Sussex, on 6 December. There is a small fee to cover costs. Casework

Our caseworkers are working on a number of cases at the moment, including on housing, sites, police complaints, racial discrimination, private site planning, benefits and homelessness.

We ran an information stall at the Romany Roots festival at the Weald and Downland museum on 15 and 16 September. The festival was a great success, with all day music, lots of old wagons, stalls, and horses. Unfortunately it may not run again next year, so if you attended the festival and enjoyed it, please write to the museum and let them know.

Train the Trainers

In this new project funded by the former CRE (Commission for Racial Equality), Gypsy and Traveller young people will deliver training to teachers and other educators about the issues they face in school, such as bullying, lack of appreciation of their culture, etc. We have identified six schools to potentially receive the training. We will be running a youth group for ten weeks in Hastings this autumn/winter with lots of activities for the young people and to plan the training sessions.

Site Design

The consultation period has ended for the draft

guidances on the design of sites for Gypsies and Travellers and on the management of Gypsy and Traveller sites. The Gypsy and Traveller Unit, at Communities and Local Government, tell us that they are going through the comments received, and hope to publish the final versions by the end of this year.

Security of Tenure on Local Authority Gypsy and Traveller Sites

The government announced this summer that they will deal with the Connors v UK judgment (i.e. the necessary change to the law for security of tenure on) in the upcoming Housing and Regeneration Bill.

Government's Single Equality Bill threatens to turn the clock back on ethnic minority rights

Gypsies and Irish Travellers are recognised as ethnic minorities under Britain's race relations law. In recent years, the Commission for Racial Equality (CRE) has helped Gypsies and Irish Travellers in a number of ways, especially through the CRE's regional offices.

At the end of September 2007 the CRE ceased to exist, along with the Equal Opportunities Commission and the Disability Rights Commission. The work of all three commissions will be taken on by a new organisation, the Equality and Human Rights Commission (EHRC).

In June 2007 the Government published a report called the Discrimination Law Review, making proposals for a new Single Equality Bill which would replace existing equality laws and give the new EHRC a framework for its activities. The Traveller Law Reform Project,

along with many other organisations (including the former CRE), thinks that the proposals are bad and would weaken existing protection for ethnic minorities, including Gypsies and Irish Travellers.

One of the worst proposals is to remove the duty of public bodies to have 'due regard' in all their actions to the need to remove unlawful discrimination and promote equality of opportunity and good race relations. Instead public bodies would simply have to come up with some self-chosen 'priorities' and work on them 'proportionately' - so if a local authority did not want to bother doing anything to address the discrimination faced by Gypsies and Travellers, it would not have to do so.

The consultation period on the DLR ended on 4 September. TLRP will keep in contact with the EHRC as the new Commission's work develops, encouraging it to ensure that the former CRE's work in support of Gypsies and Travellers is built on and developed, not lost. TLRP will work with others to try to ensure that any Single Equality Bill that the Government introduces will guarantee the rights of Gypsies and Travellers.

Housing and Regeneration Bill and Planning Reform Bill presents opportunities for Gypsy and Traveller accommodation

In July, the Government published a 'Green Paper' (a consultation paper) called *Homes for the future: more affordable,*

The Government has said it will introduce a Housing and Regeneration Bill late this year or in 2008. This will merge the Housing

Corporation, which distributes funds to housing associations to build new social housing, and English Partnerships, which plans housing projects in new growth areas.

It will also implement the recommendations of the Cave Review of Social Housing Regulation and the 2004 European Court of Human Rights ruling on security of tenure for Gypsies and Travellers on council-run sites.

The Planning Reform Bill will establish a new separate planning

system for major infrastructure projects and simplify the planning system for minor home improvements. In many cases formal planning permission will no longer be required. It will also address underperformance of planning authorities and examine ways to address that under-performance.

Both these Bills could have a helpful impact on Gypsies and Travellers. They will present an important opportunity to draw attention to, and address, some of the flaws in the current Gypsy and Traveller accommodation

policies contained in the Housing Act 2004 and ODPM Circular 01/2006. We need to make sure that the targets being set for construction of homes include Gypsy and Traveller site construction.

We also need to make sure that residents on council-run Gypsy and Traveller sites get similar rights to residents in council flats and houses – not just security of tenure but rights of succession and exchange, etc. The Planning Reform Bill might provide a framework for a national network of transit sites.

If the published Bills do not contain clauses which would benefit Gypsies and Travellers, it is important that Gypsies and Travellers and their supporters work with sympathetic MPs and Peers to ensure that beneficial amendments are added.


New Publications and Events

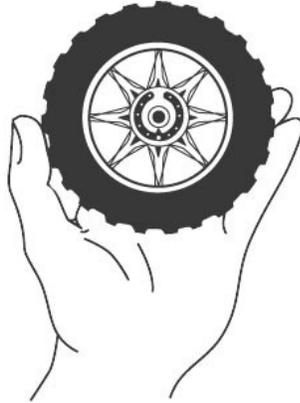

established in response to the passage through Parliament of the 1994 Criminal Justice & Public Order Act. It has since grown into a nationally recognised voluntary organisation which serves the whole spectrum of the Traveller community, both traditional and new, settled or on the road.

The majority of work promoted by FFT is carried out by an Advice and Information Unit based in Brighton and covers evictions,

harassment, planning, employment, benefits, education, health, civil rights, discrimination and legal representation. The Unit is also active in research, monitoring, mediation and policy development at local and national levels.

In 1999, FFT was one of five organisations short listed for the Human Rights Award, part of the UN International Day of Human Rights.

FFT became a company limited by guarantee (non-profit voluntary organisation) no. 3597515 and a registered charity in 2006, no. 111 2326.

FFT is run by a management committee made up of directors elected by the membership.

Management committee meetings are held every six weeks and are open to all members.
