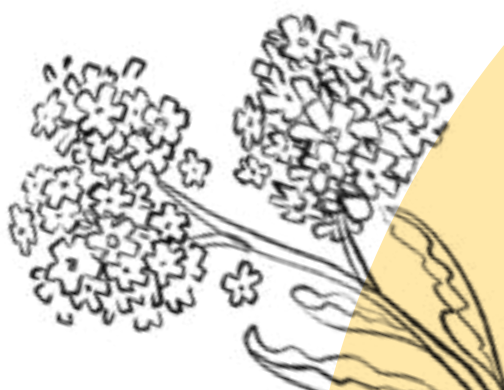
organisations invested in education and learning, this pack will guide you through what you can do to raise awareness and celebrate Gypsy, Roma and Traveller History Month.

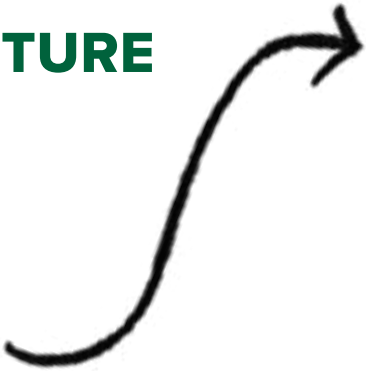

5 WAYS YOU CAN CELEBRATE GRTHM

HELP CREATE A **FAIRER AND JUST FUTURE FOR GYPSY, ROMA AND TRAVELLER COMMUNITIES** BY TAKING THE STEPS ON THE FOLLOWING PAGES OR COME UP WITH SOME OF YOUR OWN!



WHY IT'S IMPORTANT TO GET INVOLVED:

- **Romany Gypsies, Roma and Irish Travellers experience the lowest educational attainment at all Key Stages out of any ethnic groups in the UK¹.**
- **Gypsy, Roma and Traveller pupils are more likely to experience restraint and isolation in schools².**
- **Gypsy, Roma and Traveller pupils are two to three times more likely to be excluded than the national rate³.**
- **Gypsy, Roma and Traveller pupils often report that they've come to expect bullying because no action was being taken to prevent or respond to it⁴.**
- **62% of Gypsies and Travellers have experienced racial abuse, the highest out of all minority ethnic groups surveyed⁵.**

SPEAK TO GYPSY, ROMA AND TRAVELLER MEMBERS OF YOUR LOCAL COMMUNITY AND MAKE A GRTHM PLAN TOGETHER

Although over 1 in 100 people in the UK are from Romany Gypsy, Roma and Irish Traveller communities, many may not share their ethnicity in fear of discrimination, with 44% of Gypsies and Travellers reporting fear of being physically attacked⁶.

You may not be aware that peers, colleagues or friends are Romany Gypsy, Roma, Irish Traveller or from nomadic communities. Consider ways you can co-create an inclusive environment—welcoming spaces benefit everyone!

SET UP FOR A FORUM FOR GYPSY, ROMA AND TRAVELLER PEOPLE

Great things happen when we come together!

Dorset Council's Gypsy and Traveller Liaison Forum⁷, Gypsy, Roma and Traveller Police Association⁸ and the Gypsy, Roma and Traveller Social Workers Association⁹ are just a few examples of forums that have successfully bridged the gap between local organisations and institutions, and Gypsy, Roma and Traveller communities.

Forums allow a variety of perspectives and needs to be considered, so why not have a go at setting up your own?

INCLUDE GYPSY, ROMA AND TRAVELLER HISTORIES AND CULTURES IN YOUR LESSONS, ASSEMBLIES OR TRAINING

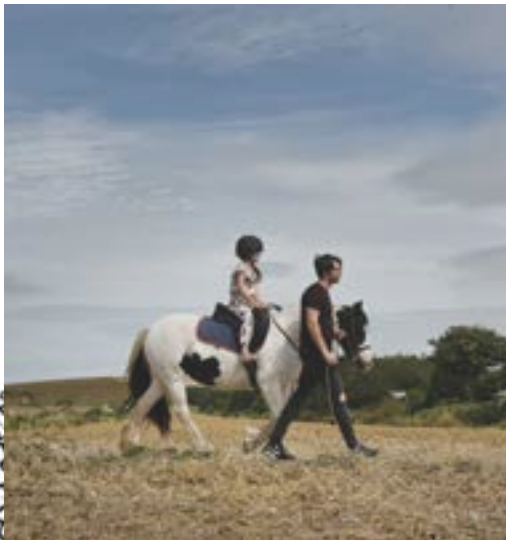
There is most likely a child in your classroom, or a colleague who is from a Gypsy, Roma or Traveller community.

REVIEW YOUR ANTI-BULLYING AND DISCRIMINATION POLICIES AND PROCEDURES



Almost half of British adults openly express negative attitudes against Gypsy, Roma and Traveller communities¹². That's more than for any other minority ethnic group.

Gypsy, Roma and Traveller people are exposed to this hate from a young age, so set aside some time to review your anti-racist and anti-bullying policies and procedures in your organisation.

GYPSY, ROMA AND TRAVELLER HISTORY MONTH IN THE CLASSROOM

ALL AGES CAN TAKE PART IN **GRTHM CELEBRATIONS** AND WE'VE PUT TOGETHER A FEW ACTIVITIES YOU COULD DO, DEPENDING ON WHICH AGE GROUP YOU ARE WORKING WITH.

5-7 years old (KS1):

Encourage your class to think about what inspiration means, and perhaps even think about drawing it!

7-11 years old (KS2):

Create a comic strip based on the life of an inspiring Gypsy, Roma or Traveller person—take a look at our **Famous Gypsy, Roma and Traveller people resource** for some inspiration!

11-14 years old (KS3):

Consider exploring what some of the challenges of travelling may be—think about things like height barriers which prevent vehicles stopping overnight, or how to access healthcare when on the road.

14-16 years old (KS4):

Watch our '**Standing on the Shoulders of Giants**' **YouTube series** on Gypsy, Roma and Traveller campaigners who fought for change, and come up with your own campaign to bring about a change you want to see—it could be to improve health inequalities, education prospects, or to ensure everyone can have a good quality of life.

WHAT A DIFFERENCE INSPIRATION CAN MAKE

Inspirational people are often those who treat others with kindness, compassion and don't judge based on gender, race, ethnicity, or background. Below is a story from a Romany Gypsy man from the North of England, called Terry, on his inspirations.

"Back in the early 80s around 1981/2 I just got out of prison. I served 3 years due to my foolish behaviour. When I arrived home to my mother's house, I lodged there for 6 months then moved into my sister's for another 3 months.

I was unsettled going from one place to another, I was unemployed and only getting around £40 a week from the dole office. I did a bit of scrapping with brothers and cousins making a bit of money on the side to support myself. I needed clothes, I liked to look smart. One day we made a good wage from a tarmac job I felt rich because I had a couple of hundred pounds in my pocket.

That week I went into the town and got new pants, a couple of shirts and new boots. I called into a second hand shop, there I picked up a nice gray strip suit. It was only £8. A couple of weeks later I went to a christening for my cousin's child. The local chapel was well known and used by the Traveller community.

Fr Ged always called onto the trailer site and into my mum's home to see my dad, he was in a wheelchair.

Fr Ged came to the christening part held on the site. When he spoke to me his words were, "Terry you look smart, you must have got a job". We spoke for a little while and I explained how I made a few quid. He said to me, "Why not get a proper job! You will have a wage every week, try and find a home, get yourself settled."

I did that I found a good job in a cotton factory and I got myself a little two bedroom flat with the council. Being a Gypsy I could easily come across the things I wanted. I asked people on the site and at work, I soon had a lovely comfortable home I was working and keeping a bit of money in the bank. I see Fr Ged at my mum's home and I told him what I have achieved. He was pleased and said "well done, I knew you could do it!"

He went on to say "now why not find something you love doing and make something of it". I do love to cook and learnt a lot from my family and cousins. Fr Ged said "why not go into college and learn more!"

I could not tell him out of pride and shame I'm not that good at reading and writing so said I will try.

That weekend I went into town. I was standing in for a pool match. When I got there, the lads said everyone turned up so I could do. I had a couple of drinks then headed towards home. Cutting through the back towards the





taxi, I seen a sign. It simply said, 'Come in, learn to dance'. I went in just to have a look, I sat in a chair just inside the door. The music was really nice and it was lovely to see the people dancing and enjoying themselves. The old lady asked me if I would like a cup of tea, it was only a tenpence. I sat there for about 30 minutes then this really old lad came to me and said "do you like dance?" I said I've never danced.

I GOT A CERTIFICATE AND
A MEDAL.

The next question was "would you like to learn?" I said I can't read or write properly and mentioned I might not be able to pay to learn. He smiled and said don't worry about reading and writing, and the cost would be £3 a lesson. From there, every week, sometimes twice a week, I went and learned to dance, ballroom, Latin, and sequence. After 6 months I got a certificate and a medal. I felt proud and went over to my mum's. When she read the certificate she smiled and said "Well done my son". Fr Ged said the same

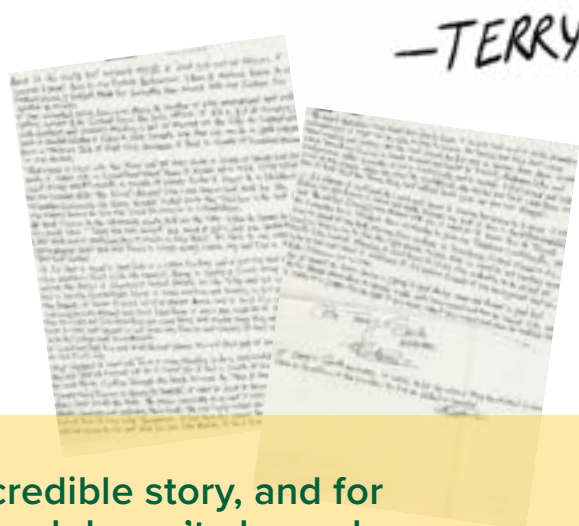
thing and added, "Don't give up, you can change".

I did change.

I continued to work and learn to dance for near to 6 years. I was taking up 3 or 4 lessons a week and really enjoyed myself. I was a Gold Bar medalist and the old lad (Cyril) was pleased with me. I went on to learn how to teach for 6 months as a student, then 12 months to gain my teacher's certificate.

I was so proud of myself, moving from nothing to something. Fr Ged played a big part in helping me to see the right people to gain help in reading and writing and mostly to be careful. Meaning I don't have to hide my identity to be proud of who I am and what I achieved. I did inform friends of my background, but did hide it from a lot as well.

So I learnt to know being a Gypsy is good. Being open and honest is good. But not to share information. To openly wait until you're asked and then be honest. Life as



We're so grateful to Terry for sharing his incredible story, and for showing that inspiring people is infectious and doesn't always have to be through huge gestures—they can come in small acts that we can all do every day. Just asking someone how they are doing can even brighten their day!

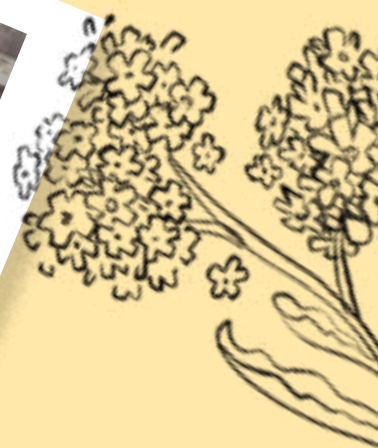

Read '***The Django***' by Levi Pinfold²¹, a picture book about an imaginary friend, Django, inspired by the famous jazz musician Jean "Django" Reinhardt.

Based on real life accounts, '***Spokes: Stories from the Romani World***'²² is filled with short stories featuring British Gypsies, Irish Travellers, East European Roma; and people whose Romani background has remained under wraps.
